Course Details

Examination and Non-exam Assessment The course is examined as a whole at the end of Year 13. Students complete one Non-exam Assessment,

Paper One: Language and the Individual

English Language offers opportunities for students to develop their subject expertise by exploring key language concepts and engaging with a range of texts and discourses. In this paper they will be expected to analyse the meanings and representations shown in the synoptic texts.

In Year 2 students will also study a unit on how children acquire language for the children's language question on paper 1.

Paper Two: Language Varieties

Students will study a variety of topics including language and gender and accents and dialects (in Year 1) and language and ethnicity and language change (in Year 2).

Non-exam Assessment (NEA)

Students must produce a 3,500 word language investigation and creative writing piece. This can be an area of specific language study.

TASK	TOPIC	
1	Language and the individual	Collect a variety of texts (at least 5). The texts should be either persuasive or informative such as a newspaper opinion article, an extract from an autobiography or a persuasive charity leaflet etc. You can use physical texts or print them from online sources but you must be able to hand in all five to your Paper 1 teacher, physically, in your first lesson.
		Annotate the texts for the following:
		language methods and what they suggest to the reader
		structure features and what they suggest to the reader who the intended reader might be and how you can tell
		what any graphology (images, font choices, colours etc) suggests
	Language and the individual	how the subject/ topic/ focus of the texts is represented e.g.: if it is a persuasive charity leaflet, how is the charity represented and how are the people/ animals/ places that the charity supports represented?
2	Language Varieties	Read a text of your choice from the wider reading list below and produce a power-point presentation to share with the class. Ensure to include points about the following:
		Key points Key language features and debates.
3.		Accents and dialects research. Analyse and research your own accent and dialect. Make a list of all the features of your own speech patterns. Then research the features of an accent

	of your choice. Consider the way the words sound and the intonation (accent) and the types of word used (dialect).
4	Language and occupation research. Choose an occupation such as Law and research all the language used including evidence of specialist and restricted lexis. Look at how language is used in this workplace and make a presentation in PowerPoint.
